Imagine standing in the pre-dawn looking out at a thousand or more faces, some very young and some very old. A fire glowing at the foot of the flagpoles, ADF cadets still as statues, heads bowed in respect. In the distance, beyond the massive crowd more fire drums and the smell of cooking bacon, eggs, sausages and beans.

The bag pipes start, and out of the darkness children march with handmade lanterns, they place them around the memorial rock, with its sorrowful list of local boys, now so long gone.

Some years it's bitterly cold, sometimes it's raining, sometimes just the promise of a beautiful Autumn day. But whatever the weather, they come, a thousand and more to give thanks, to honour, to remember.

This is the Anzac Dawn Service in a tiny town of just 1,700 people, our very own Millgrove.

The Millgrove Dawn Service commenced seventeen years ago, after Brian Halit arranged to have the Memorial Rock placed in the reserve adjacent to the fire station. While acknowledging that the RSL conducted a service at Yarra Junction, MRAG and the

Wesburn-Millgrove Fire Brigade were keen to see one in Milly-g. With the blessing of the RSL Warby Sub- Branch, and with their oversight we went ahead.

That first year, we guessed we may be able to get 100 people out of bed. By quarter to six there were around 500! The next year it doubled, and it seems to just get bigger each year.

The service is planned and funded by the fire brigade and MRAG. We are committed to ensuring that the service is kept to around 30 minutes, that we always have top notch musicians, high quality sound system and of course a ripper free Gunfire Breakfast, minus the rum (we think).

We are always supported by live bag pipes, bugle, ADF Cadets Catafalque Party and the RSL.

What a great honour it has been to host this amazing event for seventeen years. To see Upper Yarra community at its VERY best. If you ever need reminding of why we live where we live, then just come to the Millgrove Dawn Service.

We Will Remember Them.

Exchanging Knowledge: Warburton Adventure Co. + Maddog Adventures Timor-Leste

You may know that Warburton Adventure Co. (WAC) operates in Warburton and the Yarra Valley, but you may not know our connection with our sister company, Maddog Adventures, in Asia's newest country: Timor-Leste.

Sam and Liesel Maddock launched Maddog Adventures in Timor-Leste because of their desire to make Timor-Leste's incredible natural assets: from its mountains (reaching almost 3000m high!) to its unparalleled coral reefs – accessible. They wanted to give travellers the opportunity to experience the culture and learn the history of this new-to-tourism country. Today, Maddog Adventures offers tours in history and culture, coffee, canyoning, hiking, trail running, snorkelling, mountain biking, as well as experiential programs for Australian school students.

To date, five of WAC's Warburton team have been given the opportunity to work in Timor-Leste, and in March this year we welcomed two members of our Timorese team: Mana Guida and Maun Marcal - to see our Warburton operation for the first time. These cross-cultural experiences encourage upskilling across both adventure businesses.

Mana Guida and Maun Marcal observed our guided tours and met with Visit Victoria and industry stakeholders. Their on-the-job training included caving at Britannia Creek Cave, mountain biking to the Redwood Forest and Lysterfield, abseiling, river sledding and tubing down the Birrarung/Yarra River. In-house sessions covered risk and safety, maintaining gear and digital marketing. They also observed tourism trends during the busy Easter period when Warburton transforms into a thriving nature destination.

"It was wonderful to meet, work and skill-share with our international visitors Guida and Marcal," said WAC adventure guide Sean Marler. "Although living in different countries, we connected through shared interests of nature and adventure play."

We thank everyone who welcomed Mana Guida and Maun Marcal to our beautiful region, especially the generous local families who hosted them, and long-term friends and collaborators including Cleo and Wayne from Silva Coffee Roasters, who visited Timor-Leste in 2023 for our inaugural Silva Coffee Origin tour.

These exchanges prepare us for the upcoming Timor-Leste adventure season, which launched in April and includes the iconic 10-day La Rende! trek, next departing 31 May. Pop into WAC HQ, 3375 Warburton Hwy, to find out more!

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Solving transport crisis for most vulnerable community members

During bushfire evacuations or when urgent medical appointments are needed, the peaceful remoteness of the mountains can become a hazard for anyone without a car. This challenge has inspired Fiona Garnier and a group of local women, alongside partner organisations and community representatives, to propose an innovative solution.

Together, they have formed the Upper Yarra Community Transport Steering Group, made up of local residents and partner organisations, and are preparing a funding application made available to revitalise business and employment following the end of commercial timber harvesting on public land.

For Ms Garnier, the issue is personal. She experienced first-hand how hard it can be to survive without transport when she moved to East Warburton in 2011 with her daughter and four grandchildren.

“We were 4.8 kilometres from the school and the eldest was already enrolled in Warburton Primary School, so we thought it would be best to leave him there. We didn’t have a car and there were only four buses in the daytime (weekdays), two on Saturday and none on Sunday. The buses were too early or too late for school times,” she said.

“Later, I moved to Reefton and the nearest bus stop was at Magpie Lane, 14 kilometres away.”

Ms Garnier said the experience highlighted that some members of the community, especially people ageing in place, were totally reliant on a car. “People might be quite happy to take a bus, but they can’t get there because of mobility issues, a medical condition, the topography is difficult, inclement weather or even what happens at the other end of the trip,” she said.

“When I saw transport was one of the issues being considered for funding, I was so thrilled. We are incredibly grateful to Council, because this is something the community has been discussing for around ten years.”

The Upper Yarra Community Transport Project is proposing to tap into existing local services, reducing risk and building on the experience of established providers. Under the proposal, EV Services (formerly Eastern Volunteers) would deliver the transport service and manage volunteer drivers, while local community organisations - including ADRA Redwood Community Centre, LinC Yarra Valley and Cire Services (Yarra Junction Community Hub) - would support residents by referring them to the service and helping them work out what they can reasonably afford to contribute per trip.

“The idea is that EV Services will provide the cars and volunteer drivers, and people will contribute toward the cost of their trip based on their circumstances - often around 50 per cent,” Ms Garnier said.

“This model is based on the Community Driven approach that has been operating successfully in Romsey and Lancefield since 2017. What appealed to us was that it’s flexible, locally led and already proven to work.”

“One of the members looked into similar schemes and one of the big challenges is risk and infrastructure. With EV Services, that risk management is already in place, because we’re working with an experienced not-for-profit that is already delivering community transport.”

The Steering Group has developed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in preparation for the funding application,



which is currently in the process of being signed by partner organisations and community representatives.

The group is now finalising funding applications for submission in mid-May, seeking support for a 2½-year program. During this period, the Steering Group aims to design and test the service while developing a financially sustainable model that can continue beyond the initial funding term.

The Upper Yarra Community Transport Project is one of five community-led initiatives supported by Yarra Ranges Council and DEECA that aim to bolster business and employment opportunities in the region.

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YREC - Growing Business

Yarra Ranges Enterprise Centre (YREC) is a Warburton-based not-for-profit organisation that gives initial help to small and micro business startups with those crucial first steps from great idea to profitable operation.

The services supplied by YREC include provision of operating spaces at low rental, power and electronic connections, referrals to professional mentoring, training and access to networking. The Centre has been managed since 2014 by Alison Fitzgerald on a 3 day per week basis. With an MBA degree and broad experience with business development in local government institutions, Alison is well placed to lead YREC's activities. She describes YREC as a business village - a cluster of like-minded people supporting each other. Under her leadership, a number of well-established businesses have started their journey to business success at YREC.

A very broad range of enterprises will be accepted into YREC. The selection process includes a need for prospective tenants to have a business plan and the ability to meet rental obligations.

YREC was set up in Lilydale in 1998, and moved to its present location of 21 Woods Point Road, Warburton in 2000. It is a public company limited by guarantee, and is overseen by a board of directors. Funding initially came from both federal and state governments with some input from locally sourced grants.

And YREC has been busy! There are 24 operating spaces available at YREC, and there are currently 20 businesses in tenancy. Alison aims for an average tenancy period of 3-4 years. Since inception, the Centre has hosted over 300 tenants, many of whom have moved on to larger premises with expanding businesses.

It has not always been an easy ride. Initially, YREC had a management agreement with the owner (Victorian State

Government), which included the responsibility for maintaining the property and managing operations with rent charged to tenants.

YREC takes ownership. Uncertainty was created when the Victorian state government announced in 2015 that it would be selling the Wood's Point Road site. This prompted the decision by YREC's board to purchase the site. A contract for purchase from the state government was signed in 2018, and a major milestone was achieved when full payment was made in November 2021. This established a firmer basis for confidence and strategic planning.

Looking to the future. Achievements under Alison Fitzgerald's direction have been impressive. However, operating at close to full occupancy leaves very little potential for YREC to expand its established activities. Alison and the YREC board are currently exploring possibilities for new related activities that could broaden the services that YREC offers.

Controlling European Wasps in Warburton

Whilst Warburton has largely escaped the European wasp problem affecting many country towns (all down to Iain Kemp's relentless campaign over the last 10 years in trapping queens in Spring and eradicating nests) our late burst of warm weather has seen a few around both ends of town. Thank you to the person marking the three nests down in the couch grass near the Platypus mural; they were quickly dealt with.

If you see a wasp nest, which can be easily identified by seeing wasps coming and going during daylight hours, mark in some way so at night you can find it easily and with a red filter, (red celliform over your torch - definitely no white light) quietly approach the opening and squirt heaps of spray or powder,

available at the hardware into the hole. There are usually a few "sentries" on guard so be careful. As they hunker down for the night this will normally get the lot.

In our Spring edition of this publication, we will have a full rundown on setting bait traps for the queens, as each queen trapped is one less nest to deal with later. The honey bees don't seem to be interested in the traps so this does not affect honey bees.

The photo above is me handling a very angry nest at YREC in an enclosed space. Full bee suits for easy access nest openings are not really needed as long as above thoughts are followed.

Club History 1913 (Founded 1921) - 2026

100 + Year History Warburton Bowls Club

Founded 28th July 1921

By John Harrison to 1997, Robin Fisher to 2010 & Steve Freestone from 2011

1913 – 1914

A Bowling Club with about 40 Members has been formed at Warburton and Mr. Sears, proprietor of the Mountain Grand Guesthouse, has agreed to allow the club the use of his Bowling Green.

The League has taken the initial steps to the foundation of a club. An offer has been made of the use of a private green, certain arrangements for upkeep to be undertaken by the club.

The Warburton Bowls Club was founded on 28th July 1921.

1921-1922 President W. Winstanley, Secretary H. Grant.

This is the Foundation date used when the club was granted a worthless piece of swampland in the Recreation Reserve that they built into a fine 3 rink green.

One has only to walk past the recreation reserve now to realise what a splendid improvement the green is to the oval. Where formerly there was nothing but an ugly, irregular piece of ground, there is now a trim levelled piece of ground that in a very short time, will resolve itself into a fine green.

Since these early days, the Warburton Bowls Club has participated in the Upper Yarra Bowls Association, Mountain District Bowls Association and Yarra Valley Bowls Association. Our first season in the Melbourne Metropolitan Competition was in 2010-2011, where the club has played ever since.

The club's top side achieved top of the ladder in Division 1 in 2019-2020 winning the Sectional Final. They just missed out on reaching the Premier League losing to MCC in the Divisional Semi Final. An outstanding achievement for such a small club.

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Welcoming Autumn in The Valley

There's a particular stretch of the Yarra Rail Trail that habit leads me to almost every time I leave my house for a walk. In summer, I'm out there with many other walkers, riders, runners – visitors to the valley on hired bikes soaking in the country air, locals with whom I often share small smiles and head-bobs of recognition. With blue skies energising mind and body alike, it's hard NOT to want to head out and enjoy the feeling of your strides stretching out along the gravel path, while you look around and see, sense, the life bursting from everywhere in bright summer colour.

Colder weather greets us in the mornings now though, and rain is settling in. Autumn is upon us, and often I find that the trails and tracks of Warburton and Millgrove are a little emptier. Fewer shared head-bobs, not nearly as many instances of fleets of bikes sailing past me into the distance.

It's only natural. With the fire lit, and perhaps tea and a book waiting ready, it's hard to want to go anywhere, let alone into the cold for a walk. From inside, or in the car driving home, with the mountains somewhat hidden with mist and the sunlight not glinting off the Yarra in quite the same way that it does in summer, the outdoors doesn't always look as inviting as it did a month or two ago.

Yet once you are outside... there's something about the way that autumn changes the landscape, how its chill air stimulates the senses, that enlivens and enchants. It is my favourite time of year.

In summer, walking along my favourite stretch of the trail, I look out and up to the mountains and feel vital and alive. Vivid atomic energy of sunrays through the atmosphere vibrates the air between me and everything: every stone of gravel, every gently shifting leaf on trees both close and distant, all of it feels alive and close enough to touch, like I could run up the mountain from where I am without pausing for breath.

When Autumn comes, this atmosphere shifts. The air feels both clear and heavy, laden with water. Each inhalation brings the strong scent of verdant life: breathing in lungfuls of it you can smell and feel as well as see how the waters of autumn have refreshed the plant life of the valley. Grass thickens by the path. Ferns flourish. A pond that for months, when I passed it, was all but empty, cracked mud staring dryly up at cloudless skies, has been restored by the rain, and is full now not only of water but (obligingly for this idyll that I'm painting) ducks, whose reflections gliding across the pond suit it better than did the dry weeds of a few weeks ago.



From indoors perhaps, the outdoors doesn't call as strongly, its beauty isn't as overt. But it is beautiful. Mountains that were close enough to touch now seem to have a sense of myth about them – there's a new depth of tone, a presence, and though they seem more distant, I feel more than I have on previous weeks' walks the way they hold the edges of the valley.

There is frog-song when you pass still water; and the white trunks of gums, against the deepening colours around them, are bright gracenotes. And I never knew until I began to walk regularly past the Millgrove timber mill how much I like the scent of woodchips after rain.

Like the gums, silver wattle trees are wet-weather belles. The way their pale-green fronds look when lightly misted with rain is like the silver sister of the golden wattle it will bloom later in the year – where spring's arrival is marked with bursts of yellow-gold clusters, in autumn and winter, water droplets clinging to pale leaves give the appearance of hundreds of reflective silver lights, the arboreal night to golden wattle's day.

Of all the stunning natural transformations the Valley sees in autumn, the embers and ambers of deciduous trees is no doubt the most widely appreciated – and rightly so, in many ways. I look forward to it every year. But there are, as I have only begun to touch on, many facets to the loveliness of a Yarra Valley autumn. My walks are chillier now, but soaking in these sights and feelings as I go, I feel invigorated. I feel incredibly lucky to live in a place with so much natural beauty. The landscape may change with the seasons throughout the year – but each fresh incarnation brings its own delights, and they're worth getting up from beside the fireplace to experience.

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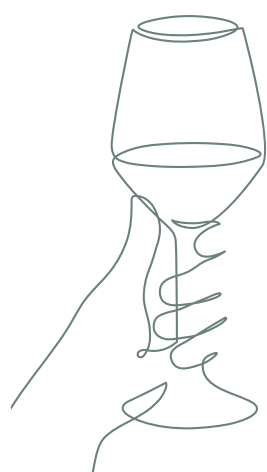

Important Update from Yarra Ranges Council

- Intermittent transmission issues on 96.1FM

The Warburton Emergency Planning Group (WEPG) have received the following update regarding the ABC Radio Melbourne transmission on 96.1FM:

Dear WEPG,

Thank you for your patience as investigations are undertaken to safeguard the reliability of Warburton's emergency radio coverage.

Council has been working with our contractor to understand the interruptions to the ABC radio coverage on 96.1FM. As you can appreciate this process has a number of considerations to explore and we are progressing well with our investigations.

To date we have been exploring the age and operational status of the equipment, potential changes to our antenna placement, development of an equipment replacement program and the occurrence of possible signal interference. We will continue to collect this data so we can arrive at a comprehensive plan to rectify faults.

We also wanted to advise you that the

following works are being undertaken in May:

- On 5th May, weather permitting, there will be a cut over to a new transmission cable that will cause radio outage lasting up to 45 minutes. We have not been advised of the expected time of the interruption, but we are hoping to have a better idea closer to the date.
- The Rx antenna will be relocated (from 6 to 28 metres) and cut over to a new cable also, however there should be no interruption to transmission during this action.

We will be posting notification of this to social media, however your assistance in notifying your community of this scheduled interruption would be appreciated.

Please be assured that Council is committed to arriving at a solution that meets the needs of Warburton and surrounding communities for receiving emergency advice and warnings. WEPG will keep the community updated on future communications.

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
