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Important Step Forward for Former Weet Bix Factory Restoration

Eagle eyed locals may have noticed recent activity at the top of the former Weet Bix factory chimney, with the installation of a new chimney cap and stabilisation frame. While the work may appear modest at first glance, it marks a significant milestone in the long, careful journey to revive one of Warburton's most iconic heritage sites.

For heritage buildings, even seemingly simple works require extensive preparation. In this case, the chimney upgrade followed more than two years of detailed investigation, including specialist surveys by heritage-qualified engineers and securing approvals from multiple heritage authorities. All of these steps are essential given the building's historical significance.

The stabilisation and capping form part of a broader series of reports and assessments required ahead of a future planning permit application for the site. Because previous permits and historic approvals can no longer be relied upon, every stage must be reassessed under current regulations, a process that demands both patience and persistence. The recent chimney works may be just one step, but it signals momentum. As the careful groundwork continues, these tangible signs show that this much loved landmark is being protected and prepared for a new chapter.

The new units will soon be connected and providing a much better 'relief' experience.

Key Milestones and upcoming Actions,

- Plumbing and Electrical disconnected late April.
- Existing Amenities demolished early May.
- W/C 11/5 Mick retained and filled (crush rock in line with the existing slab) the foundation/pad.
- W/C 11/5 Plumber inspected the units at the Alpine and visited YREC to plan the Plumbing works.
- Wednesday the 20/5 Transport has been booked to relocate the units from the Alpine to YREC, Starting at the Alpine between 8-9am. (Crane Truck at \$155.00 per hour for a maximum of 6hrs with a minimum of 4hrs, Costs between \$620.00 & \$930.00 for the move)
- 20/5 Have engaged Mick for the morning to aide with the placing and leveling the units.
- Once the Units are on site, we can start planning the plumbing & electrical connections, Hopefully W/C 25/5.

Fingers crossed we have functioning Toilets in early June.

As a certified Passive House Designer I bring expertise in sustainable home design, creating homes that are energy efficient, healthy and comfortable; warm in winter, cool in summer, and much more affordable to run.

I grew up in the countryside of Japan, where good buildings are

designed around the surrounding landscape and local climate — very similar to here in the Upper Yarra Valley. That sensibility is something I bring to every project, not as a style, but as a way of thinking about how a room feels at different times of day, how a home connects to the land outside, and how good design makes everyday living more meaningful.

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Stringybark Supplies - From bright idea to exciting business

Ten years ago, Marcus Thomson was a young exploration geologist looking for an alternative to the fly-in-fly-out life he was leading. He was on the hunt for a business to start.

One Christmas, rather than dispose of the family Christmas tree, he had the spark of an idea. On the verandah of his Bendigo home, he sawed the trunk of the tree into 8 thin slices that could be used as drink coasters. He posted them on Etsy and they sold almost immediately. And, shortly after, he received an order from the USA for 110 slices. Bingo! Maybe there was something in this. Stringybark Supplies came into existence.

In 2016 Marcus and family moved from Bendigo to Warburton, and, with a leap of faith, he set up shop in YREC - the Yarra Ranges Enterprise Centre. With not much more equipment than a good drop-saw and some sanding gear, Marcus set about cutting slices from radiata pine logs and selling them online. Marketing involved a strong focus on his website and search engine optimisation.

The major market segments that Marcus targeted were weddings, corporate promotion, and general craft supplies - eg, craft suppliers, schools, early learning centres.

Business grew, and in 2020, Marcus moved Stringybark Supplies to the Yarra Ranges Council's industrial complex in Britannia Creek Road, Wesburn. This allowed for further expansion with greater space and, all importantly, 3-phase power.

In order to manage the increased scale of production, Marcus has developed his own automated log-slicing machine. He dries the wood slices in bulk using dehumidifiers and large drying racks. He has installed a wide-belt sander and two large UV flatbed printers that will print directly on to his full range of slices.

Marcus uses only radiata pine logs for his work. This species dries with minimal splitting, has a long life after processing, and retains its bark well. His source of logs is a large pine plantation on the outskirts of Melbourne which has a requirement to maintain a certain area of native forest vegetation. Marcus harvests radiata pine escapes that contaminate these native forest areas - something that the plantation owner is very happy about.



Marketing is now largely dependent on paid ads (mostly Facebook and to a lesser extent, Google). His output has grown considerably - his largest order to date is for 20,000 corporate logo pieces. For the immediate future, he is focused on growing his business, and keeping his eye out for a new opportunity to turn an innovative idea into a profitable operation.

Warburton's Draft Resilience Plan Revealed

The Warburton Emergency Planning Group (WEPG) shared its Draft Warburton Community Resilience Plan on Tuesday May 26 at a community meeting held at Warburton's Mechanics Hall. 45 local residents came out to hear about the work that has been carried out by the small but dedicated WEPG group.

The Plan's creation process and content were presented at the beginning of the meeting to inform attendees of how the Plan was put together and what it contains. It was stressed that "we" created this Plan for "us" and that we cannot rely on "they" or "them" to take action...it is up to us.

Important information was gathered through a community survey that was conducted in late 2024. This feedback was then used, in addition to many hours of discussion over several months, to ultimately develop a plan that has identified six focus areas:

- Community connection
- Bushfire and emergency planning
- Food security
- Renewable energy
- Infrastructure and development
- Housing

The attendees had a chance to read a bit more detail about the Plan and then enthusiastically provided their thoughts, ideas, comments and suggestions on these six focus areas, as well as another table that was added to capture their feedback on what we may have missed.

With the great input received on the night WEPG will be making final edits to the Plan, which will be communicated to the Warburton community soon. High-priority action plans will be developed, and with the help of additional interested and passionate residents, the community will begin to see this Plan start to make significant and sustained improvements to Warburton's ability to withstand, adapt to and recover from adverse events while maintaining its essential functions and identity.

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WAC Finds A Way: Transport Options In And Around Warby

Getting around Warby can be challenging for locals and visitors. With fluctuating fuel prices and extended paid parking on weekends for non-residents, it's good to know there are non-car ways to get around.

WAC's helping mountain bike riders explore Warburton Bike Park with a Gravity Day Pass (\$65 a day) from Warby via Wesburn and up to Mt Bride – these are perfect for hitting the 70 km+ of green, blue and black gravity trails. Grab a Hot Lap pass (a lift up, so you can ride down) for \$15: it's great for an action-packed lunch break.

Also utilising WAC's fleet of minibuses and bike trailers is the Private MTB Pass (full day or 3-hr). As WAC logistics guru and bike legend Rob Eva says: "The groups I've taken up love the local, personal approach. I let them know what the conditions are and take them to the best runs of the day."

Hikers can book transfers to the start and/or finish of their walks from the top of Donna Buang, Redwood Forest or Walk into History. WAC also operates Warby Nightrider for transfers for local weddings, parties and events throughout winter (and more often in summer). Pre-book this service if you need to move a bunch of friends and family around!



Warburton resident Richard recently used the Warby Nightrider for 2 family weddings. "With guests from Melbourne, interstate and overseas staying in multiple locations, I felt responsible for the wellbeing of hundreds of people across the 2 events!" he said. "It was critical to us that our provider was a legit transport operator with correctly-licensed vehicles, drivers and insurance. This team, their service and pricing was fantastic (with flexibility when herding cats at 11pm after fun receptions!)"

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Upper Yarra Valley Garden Club Notes – June 2026

CLUB NEWS: At our Club meeting in May, member Ruth Woods gave a very interesting talk on plants grown for their fibres, and how those fibres can be used. Main points:

- Ruth teaches basketry and fibre crafting. She has written a book, “Finding Form with Fibre” and founded a group called Crafts School Oz.
- She learnt basketry during her time in Arnhem Land, and subsequently joined the Basketmakers of Victoria where she learned about the plants which provide the fibre.
- The most important basic sources of fibre which Ruth grows in her garden are New Zealand flax, watsonia, red hot poker and lomandra, but she has experimented with other species: grapevines, banana fibre, day lily, daffodil, philodendron, onion grass and other alliums, dracaena, arum lilies, agave, jacaranda leaf stalks, cordyline, yucca, palm inflorescences, ivy and many others.
- Wood fibre from prunings can also be used eg. from fruit trees, dogwood, cercis and willow.
- The plant materials are air-dried and subsequently re-hydrated for flexibility during working. Drying time will depend on the moisture content of the leaves
- Depending on their source, the fibres can be coiled, woven, spun, braided, waxed, incorporated into, or combined with, other materials. The possibilities are limited only by the crafter’s imagination!



- Ruth had a display table at the meeting, showing the huge variety of articles, both useful and decorative, that can be made with plant fibres.

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Salvaging history for the next generation

Fionnuala Miller is on a mission to breathe life into some of the Upper Yarra's most iconic abandoned places. She has joined the Abandoned Places Working Group - a community-led initiative supported by Yarra Ranges Council and DEECA. It is intended to revitalise business and employment following the end of commercial timber harvesting on public land.

"I was attracted to the project because I'm a serial renovator. The idea was that you can repurpose a building rather than knock it down," she said.

"Australian developers like to knock it down and I hate that. You can do so much with what already exists. There are a lot of unused places where I live. People are looking for spaces to use and it seems like such a waste."

The committee has been through a two-year process of reviewing abandoned spaces in the region and refining ideas. They are now progressing with a proposal to restore and revitalise the Launching Place General Store.

"The location is second-to-none. It's very valued for people sentimentally in the community and people don't want to see buildings like this deteriorate," she said.

"There's a lot of interest from small businesses. We could have food, arts and crafts, clothing, artisan products, including a stopover for cyclists on the Warburton trail. If a collective takes on the lease who can entertain the idea of putting people and planet before profit, then there are opportunities to do things like training, incubate startups and giving people jobs."

A proposal is currently in development with the support of the Yarra Ranges Council. The Abandoned Places Working Group is one of five community-led initiatives aiming to bolster businesses and employment in the region. Works complete at the O'Shannassy Aqueduct Dee Slip Bridge

Repairs to the Dee Slip Bridge in the Yarra Ranges National Park are now complete, with the bridge officially reopened to the community. The works have restored pedestrian, cyclist and emergency vehicle access along O'Shannassy Aqueduct Trail on Wurundjeri Country. The repairs kept to the original design of the bridge to preserve its heritage values. By retaining as much of the existing timber as possible, the project has ensured the bridge remains a historic feature of the trail for years to come.

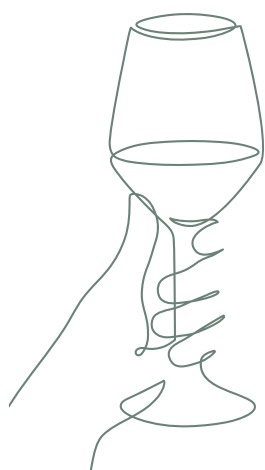

Grave Tales's post

On this day, 23 May (1907), Sam Knott, aged 66, died. Originally from Devonshire, UK, Sam ended up as a gardener at McVeigh's Upper Yarra Hotel at Walsh's Creek, Victoria. The publican, Paddy McVeigh and Sam agreed he should be paid one pound a week, and given accommodation and his meals. Each week, Paddy handed Sam a one pound note, which Sam handed straight back for his consumption of ale over the coming week. One day in 1906, a city slicker with a camera remarked Sam seemed to enjoy his pre-lunch beer. Sam replied, "I allus has wan at eleven" (or similar). He asked Sam if he could take his photograph, and Sam became Carlton Brewery's poster boy.

After 20 years at the pub, Sam passed away and is buried somewhere in the Upper Yarra Public Cemetery. A fire in 1927 destroyed the records, and the pub was burnt down in 1939. A carved statue immortalising Sam stood outside the Warburton Hotel, but it was stolen. But you can still see Sam at the bar – a similar carving is erected there in his honour. From our 'Grave Tales: Melbourne' volume.

There is another element in Sam's story that may be legend. It is said that after he died, he was laid in a simple locally made coffin, loaded on to a two-wheeled horse dray to be carried to the cemetery at Wesburn - a long and very bumpy ride. At some stage, the coffin bounced off the dray, fell on the road and broke open. Sam made the rest of the journey sitting up front between the driver and his mate!
